### **20 YEARS OF NATURE VISION**

"Thirty-two giggly, wiggly 4th graders were strewn out along the edge of the meadow. It was a partly cloudy May day at the local park...This month's science lesson was on ecosystems...The teacher had asked me to try and focus specifically on predator-prey relationships during our time at the meadow...I had just directed the class's attention toward [a] flock of robins when (as if on cue) a Cooper's hawk glided silently over our heads into the meadow. With lightning speed, it struck a robin, killing it instantly and then proceeded to take it up to a nearby branch, where it began to eat.

The class was silent. (Do you know what it takes to silence a class of 4th graders on a field trip?!) The teacher turned to me and exclaimed 'You planned that!' Of course, I hadn't. It was just nature doing what nature does in the meadow ecosystem. Once I had convinced her of my non-culpability, she said 'Now that is what I call real-world learning.'

Instantly, the learning opportunity provided by the hawk and robin was afoot! Questions started popping out of the kids like popcorn. Everyone was fully engaged for the rest of the field trip. In a later phone conversation with her, the teacher used the word 'priceless' to describe the learning outcomes that the kids had from the experience that day.
